

## cyberwise PARENT/CHILD TECH AGREEMENT

Dear <sub>.</sub>	<b>,</b>
techn	technology is an exciting privilege, but it is also a huge responsibility. Let's agree how you will use ology safely and wisely by talking about the following topics (discuss and fill in the following). This reate a tech agreement that will guide you!
1	<b>Ownership.</b> It is important to establish who owns and will pay for the technology you use. Discuss who owns the device(s) you have access to (laptop, cellphone, etc.):
	Is there a monthly cost? If so, determine who will bear that cost. Will it be paid in cash? In chores? It will be paid in part or whole by:
2	Passwords. Responsible technology users keep their passwords private and secure. They never share passwords with anyone except a parent/guardian and they keep passwords written down and stored in a secure location where they can be accessed if necessary.  Agree where passwords will be stored (indicate location, i.e. notebook in kitchen) and discuss situations that might require accessing these passwords:
3	<b>Balance.</b> Tech is awesome, but the offline world is pretty incredible too! Discuss important times to unplug, such as during meals, family gatherings, or when friends visit.
	Agree that it is important to unplug during the following times/situations:
	We also agree to limit tech use to hours per day during the week/ on weekends and will not let tech interfere with aettina enough sleep or exercise.

## **Cyberwise Parent/Child Tech Agreement, continued**

	<b>Privacy.</b> Smart technology users never divulge personal information online. This includes one's name, address, phone number, and location. They are also mindful of sharing the personal information of friends and family too. This includes sharing their photos without permission.
	Discuss and agree to your family's policy on the sharing of personal information and images of oneself and one another online:
3	<b>Reputation.</b> Everything one posts online stays online forever. It can be seen by anyone and everyone. People, even those we don't know, may judge us by our digital reputations. Responsible technology users are mindful of what they post and they are always the same good person online as they are offline.
	Discuss and agree what is inappropriate to share online:
3	<b>Civility.</b> Online communication often leaves out social cues that let others know when someone is kidding or using sarcasm. Responsible technology users treat others kindly and respectfully online, and remember to stand up for those they might see being treated cruelly.
	Discuss what measures you will take if you are treated cruelly, see another being treated cruelly, or experience hate speech or inappropriate language online.

## **Cyberwise Parent/Child Tech Agreement, continued**

	<b>Social Media.</b> Most social media sites require users to be at least 13 years of age to sign up for an account. Discuss why it is important to follow age guidelines and then decide together (and list) which social media sites are appropriate to sign up for and use:
	<b>Social Media Settings.</b> Every site and app offers an array of settings that can keep users safe online. Agree to review and discuss the settings on all sites and apps used. Set them up together
3	<b>Friends.</b> There is a difference between strangers, acquaintances and friends online. Smart technology users are discriminating about the friends they choose online. Be sure to tell a trusted adult if you receive suspicious or alaming messages or posts from anyone. Discuss your family's policy on selecting and accepting friends and followers online:
	<b>Critical Thinking.</b> You are being granted the privilege of using this powerful device because you are smart enough to know never to search for or share inappropriate information. You know not to take, send, or ask for nude pics, ever. You understand that not everything you see online is true and you should verify that something is true before you share it. You know not to "steal" the creative works of others without their permission. Discuss and list other digital activities that require critical thinking skills:

10	Asking for Help. The online world can be a vast and confusing place. Adults get confused too but that doesn't mean you shouldn't ask us for help. Together we can figure out anything tha might seem perplexing, dangerous, or even ridiculous. Please don't let anything you see or he online stop you from coming to me, or another trusted adult, for help, ever!	t
